Our story of arrival to Kinbrace

"Canada was an unknown country to us. When we arrived for refugee help, we knew no one. After finishing a long day with Canada border people, we were told to go to a hotel. It was so expensive. The next day was the worst day. We didn't know where to go or what to do or where we could find halal food. We had no Canadian money. Leaving our two little children in the hotel, we walked 45 minutes to find a shop to change currency. The shopkeeper helped us to find a bus to travel back to the hotel. After three nights in the hotel we were running out of money and desperately needed help. I thanked Allah that, even though we were so alone, he is with us. Everyday, every hour, we phoned shelters for help. Finally, a kind woman from a shelter gave us stay for 10 days. A taxi driver took us to the shelter, and when we tried to pay, he said "You do not need to pay." We were so thankful.

While we were in the shelter, we were told some people would help us find a house. We were scared. Would they be men or women? Would we be able to speak freely with them and tell them our situation? After a long time waiting, three ladies arrived from "Kinbrace." My first fear was gone because they were gentle and polite and we could easily talk with them. But then we faced a hard decision. It's very difficult to trust unknown people in a new country because you don't know their language, their culture,

their habits. As Muslims, we had never lived with non-Muslims. But we were excited about the affordable rent. And the people were kind. In our short time, we learned Vancouver is an expensive city, especially the rent. So we decided to take this low rent option with people who seemed to have good behaviour.

Before moving into Kinbrace, we were not expecting all the good things we received. We didn't think Canadians would help us, but they not only helped us with material things, they took away our loneliness. After several months living in the Kinbrace apartment, we moved to our new home which we are so thankful for. We really like it when people come and visit us!"



The COVID-19 pandemic struck mid-March 2020. It shut down critical supports for refugee claimants in the last 6 weeks of Kinbrace's fiscal year.
