In the midst of a world troubled by isolation, division, and displacement, sustaining trust is even more urgent to weave a healthy social fabric.

Participants will leave with a deepened awareness of the value of trust, and with inspiration for new ways to trust in the dynamic space where displacement and welcome meet.




This event, Becoming Neighbours - Trust, 20 responses











The facilitated event was 2 hours. In my opinion, 20 responses




If future events are planned, and I can attend, I would prefer the event at this time: 20 responses

- 1. The "gems" I took away were all comments from the lived experiences of newcomers to Canada. They gave me very important insights I would not have had otherwise and which were not necessarily intuitive. I can't know what I don't know! So I would have been happy really just to hear from newcomers. Less discussion more listening!
- 2. it was a sacred space, it was well designed and carried out -- thank you.
- 3. The welcome by the indigenous woman at the beginning had some relevant content at the end, but for a while, I was starting to wonder how long it would go on and how much it tied into the topic at hand. Maybe it was all part of making room for different cultural styles...
- 4. Really thankful to have found out about this workshop and to have the opportunity to take part in it as I am in Calgary. Thank you!
- 5. I'm glad I attended.
- 6. In my group the discussion in the first instance seemed awkward and the facilitator appeared unsure of how to get us going. In the second instance, discussion was really just getting started and it was time to go. Perhaps a bit of training or prep for facilitators so they can hit the ground running... I think the time dedicated to discussion was about right but there wasn't time for figuring things out.

- 8. I really appreciate that you offered this event via Zoom as well as in-person. It made attending it much more possible, as getting to the venue would have taken me at least an hour. I hope that any future sessions will have this option, even post-COVID.
- 9. In the question about length of the session, I said that 3 hours would be better. This was so there could be time for the groups to report back on what was said during their discussions.
- 10. As 'host' of a breakout room, some comments / recommendations:
 - a. couldn't see the the instructions / task when we were in the break-out room and I
 didn't have (or take) enough time to write it down before going into the breakout.



- Suggestion: Put it in the Chat for the breakout rooms, so that everyone can see it throughout the discussion time. Could also send them to the hosts ahead of time.
- b. need to be told how long the breakout discussion is going to be. Otherwise, can't "keep track of the time, so that everyone has a chance to speak".
- c. I'm not sure what could be done about this, but I became unable to effectively host when my internet connection became unstable. Happily, there were people in the group who stepped up and kept things going smoothly.
- 11. Providing this feedback required a Google account. There are likely people who don't have one, and thus can't give feedback?


